New Life, New Responsibility, New Growth **Rabbi Aaron Krupnick** 

It is one of the great joys of my job to help expectant parents choose Jewish names for their children. Sometimes names are chosen simply because parents like the way they sound. But,

more often than not, there is a deeper meaning, a connection; a spiritual, mystical connection to someone who has come before. So often you'll hear a family member say, "Oh, he has my father's eyes," or "her laugh is just like grandmom's..." In a very real sense, bestowing a name renews connection and reaffirms relationship, not just biologically, but spiritually as well.

We Jews have a propensity for naming Gd, and the name used most often on the High Holidays is Avinu Malkeinu, "Our Father, Our King." What kind of connection does that name imply? The simplest explanation, I suppose, is that with this name we are asserting Gd's supreme power over the world, and our lives. Gd has a set of rules to govern us; do good and be blessed, stray too far from the path and pay the price. Likewise, we parents make rules for our kids because we know what's best for them, and we let them know when they are losing their way. Children need to know that someone is in charge, someone is looking out for them, and someone cares enough to teach them right from wrong. Once, when I was a boy, I stayed out way too late and was grounded. I got angry with my Dad and said, "Eric Strauss says his dad is his best friend. YOU are NOT my best friend!" To which my father calmly replied, "Son, you will have lots of best friends, but you only have ONE father." ... That's one side to the name we give Gd, Avinu Malkeinu "Our Father, Our King."

But there is more. As I grew older I came to understand

that my Dad was not simply asserting his power over me, he wanted me to do my best and be my best. He not only wanted to set guidelines for my life, he wanted me to know that this was something I ought to be doing for myself. He knew, instinctively, that I had more potential than I gave myself credit for, and he wanted me to be the person I was truly meant to become. He did not know exactly the person I'd turn out to be, but he wanted to do his best to help me be my best. Nearly a quarter century since his passing I am still guided by his principles and thus he and I are still in relationship, father and son forever. I see my Heavenly Parent in much the same way; a Gd who sets guidelines and helps me to tap into my potential at every stage of my life.

This Rosh Ha-Shannah we are starting a new tradition for parents of babies at Beth El. We are inviting all parents who have had a child between last Rosh Ha-Shannah and this one to come for a group aliyah and a special blessing from the clergy. We will do this in both services. If you would like to participate, and have your family called to the Torah by name, please get in touch with Leora Waiche in the synagogue office.

When all that parenting entails is making rules and punishing your kids when they mess up, it's a pretty straightforward process. But we know there is a lot more to it than that. We need to set ground rules for sure, but we also need to empower our children to make decisions about their own lives that teach them valuable life skills, such as how to take responsibility for themselves. The process begins, it seems to me, with realizing both the amazing gift our new children are in our lives, and our sacred responsibility to help them to become the people Gd has intended them to be. I hope this aliyah and special blessing will help parents to feel both.

#### Prepare to Engage!

When I sit down to write my article for the Beth El News, I take time to consider what is happening in my personal life that connects me to my professional life. It's one of the reasons I enjoy working at a synagogue, because that overlap naturally occurs almost every day. It brings meaning to my Jewish life. We know that making a Jewish connection between various aspects of your life is meaningful to our congregants as well, which is why Beth El invests time and resources into creating a wide variety of opportunities for you to engage with us.

As a synagogue we strive for those very same things all day every day. We want you to be comfortable. We want you to be safe. We want to make sure you are aware of the options you have for connecting with your community. We want you to feel comfortable being you. Just as in informal education, there is extensive collaboration and planning necessary to provide this experience.

We have created a new position for one of our senior staff members. The majority of people reading this know Tamar Barkan. For the past two years, she has been our Membership, Events and Programming Director. In this role, she had the opportunity to meet many members of our community and spent much of her time developing relationships. We've made some changes to allow Tamar to do more of what she already does well. Her new role is Community Engagement Director. In this role, her primary responsibility is to work with our lay leaders, professional staff and clergy to create meaningful ways to engage current and future members of our community, as well as others that are touched by Beth El both in our building and in the surrounding area. 


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#### MEMBER SPOTLIGHT



#### Fred Behrend and Larry Hanover

Fred Behrend never intended to write a book about his life. An incredible man with a riveting story, Fred was content telling the stories of his life to anyone interested enough to sit and listen through the Esther Raab Holocaust Museum & Goodwin Education Center. It wasn't until spring 2010 that the idea of putting his life on paper came about. Larry Hanover read an email from Rabbi Arnowitz asking Hebrew High parents to come listen to a Holocaust survivor speak to the students. That survivor was, of course, Fred Behrend. After listening, Larry, a long-time reporter, convinced Fred to turn his endless stories into a memoir. And the rest is history.

Larry knew the importance of preserving the memories of survivors for future generations but says, "what grabbed me

about his story is that it is spans an entire life, far beyond the Holocaust." For the past seven years, Larry and Fred have worked together to write down Fred's story, starting in Germany, going through Cuba, and finally to America. Larry interviewed Fred endlessly, then combined that material with Fred's diary and his father's diary, and then conducted research to verify details for accuracy and add in more information. As Fred asserts, "Writing the memoir is different in that a memoir builds...Very often, we would have to stop and change the beginning of a chapter, because something important that happened before had not yet been discussed. Poor Larry had to deal with a huge number of revisions because I would wake up in the morning and there would be a new story that simply needed to go in."

Fred's outlook on life is remarkable, as he is able to recall Nazi Germany favorably. "It seems strange to be able to say that my memories are mostly positive, but in fact I saw Germany through the lens of a child whose parents spared him from the realities of what was happening in his world, for which I will forever be grateful." Fred's resilience and positivity shine through his and Larry's writing, turning what could understandably be a depressing memoir into something uplifting.

While talking about the message of <u>Rebuilt From Broken Glass</u>, Fred says, "In all those years, we have never spent any time despairing about the past and about the horrors we left behind. Instead, we used our past to fuel our futures... We had an indomitable spirit, and because we helped each other, we succeeded as a whole. We didn't just survive, we thrived, and we raised children whose faith in their religion and determination to carry on the traditions of their family and their faith show that Hitler did NOT succeed. If our readers get that message, I will consider my mission accomplished."

#### REVIVAL

Beruchim Habbaim to a new year to the education department at Congregation Beth El! I can't believe that I am already entering into my second year as your Educational Director. It feels like just yesterday I made the move over the bridge. What a great first

year! I truly feel part of the Beth El family and I am so excited for the coming year!

In Judaism we are consistently retelling the Jewish people's stories of survival. However, if you dig deeper into our history, the Jewish people did more than survive. They revived by re-imagining their faith and identity. As we approach the High Holy Day season, it is our turn to personally, and as a community to revive our spirit and souls. We at Beth EI are always looking to revive our programs and look into the future of our Shul community. We seek to create programs that are captivating and inspiring for all. We have so many new innovative programs planned that there are too many to list and describe, therefore I will provide for you a little taste of what is yet to come.

In our Religious School, we are instituting a new program for our 4th-6th grade students called "The Great Stories." In order to give our students in grades 4-6 the tools for exploring the universe of Jewish knowledge, students will be presented with four times lines: The Story of How Jews Talk to God, The Story of How Jews Tell Their Stories, The Story of Jewish Communities, and The Story of The Jewish Homeland. Students will study a different story each year and will have a choice of various mediums including art, debate, music, cooking, etc.

In our Hebrew High School, each grade will be taking a trip this year. Our 7th grade class will visit New York City as part of their American Jewish History Curriculum, our 8th grade will be joining together with other 8th grade Hebrew School students for a Night at the Museum at the National Museum for American Jewish History in Philadelphia, our 9th grade students will visit the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC, and our 10th grade students will travel to Israel on the Confirmation Trip.

Jewish learning does not end after High School. Congregation Beth El has a wonderful adult education program. We have a variety of programs from classes with the clergy, monthly educational BTV (Beth EI TV) messages from our Clergy, to inspiring guest speakers. As part of our CoLeL speaker series you will not want to miss our September and October guests. On September 14 we will welcome our very own Fred Behrend and Larry Hanover who will be talking about their newly published book, Rebuilt from Broken Glass, a German Jewish Life Remade in America. And on Sunday, October 29 we will welcome to our congregation the Babka Lady, Frimet Goldberger who will be talking about her life story about growing up in the Hasidic community of Kiryas Joel, and ultimately leaving with her husband and children to live in a modern Orthodox community.

I encourage all of you to take part in our revival. Join a committee, chair an event, share your ideas. I look forward to a wonderful year of learning with you!

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#### BELL LIBRARY NEWS—AMY KAPLAN, CONGREGATION LIBRARIAN



As schedules get more crowded and the daylight hours grow shorter, leisure pursuits take a backseat. Even so, there's always time (even if it's only a few minutes a day) for a good book. We have plenty of new novels you won't want to miss. Here are some suggestions to get you started:

*The Weight of Ink* by Rachel Kadish takes place in two time periods: 1660s London and the early 2000s. In the 1660s, Esther Velasquez, an immigrant from Amsterdam, is allowed to scribe for a blind rabbi. In the present day, Helen Watt is suffering from Parkinson's disease and planning to retire from her job as a history professor. Helen

comes upon a cache of letters written by the 17<sup>th</sup> C rabbi. Working with grad student Aaron, Helen learns that the letters were penned by a woman (Esther), which makes them historically important. Back in the 1660s, the plague descends on London, and Esther struggles to live a life of intellectual challenge. In the present day, Helen faces obstacles as well. This book features exceptional writing as it showcases two strong female characters.

Look at the cover art of *In the Shadow of Alabama* by Judy Renee Singer and you'll expect a gentle Southern story. And that's not at all what this is. Singer's novel is the story of Rachel Fleischer and her difficult father, Marty. As Marty lies dying, Rachel doesn't want to visit him. Then, at his funeral, a stranger gives Rachel an unusual gift. This leads to Rachel's discovery of the man her father truly was – a WWII Jewish sergeant in charge of a platoon of black soldiers in Alabama. Her father's experiences led to his PTSD, something she had never understood. Unusual subject matter is handled with sensitivity.

You want something topical? We have something oh-so-topical! **The Devil and Webster** by Jean Hanff Korelitz is set on a fictional college campus. Naomi Roth is the first female president. She is not surprised when the academic year opens with a student protest; student acitivism is encouraged and she participated in protests when she was an undergraduate. This protest concerns the denial of tenure to a popular professor. But soon a charismatic Palestinian student, Omar Khayal, emerges as the leader of the protest and Naomi begins to lose control of the situation. This novel addresses current issues of importance on college campuses such as political correctness and liberal values. Korelitz is the author of *Admissions*, also set in the world of academia, which was made into a feature-length film in 2013 starring Tina Fey and Paul Rudd.

Francesca Segal is the British author who wrote *The Innocents*, an award-wining 2012 novel. Her new book is *The Awkward Age*. This is a story of a blended family, but the blending is not going smoothly. Julia Alden is in love, much to her surprise, with James, an American obstetrician. Unfortunately, Julia's teenage daughter Gwen hates James. James has a 17-year-old son Nathan. Gwen seeks support from Nathan, and the two teens fall in love. Segal explores the pitfalls of parent/child relationships and families. Her style is fluid and a pleasure to read.
